# Jamie Warrow Spotlight on the Director

In a 2010 interview with the Detroit Legal News, Jamie Warrow expressed passion like this, "It's important not to forget that just because you're working so hard that there are other things to be passionate about...It's important to pursue your passion." And pursue she did. After graduating from Wayne State, she would spend most of her 20's working towards a career in theatre.

Eventually, she decided it was time to expand her pursuits engaging other passions. For Warrow, this would be in the form of studying law. In 2003, she graduated *cum laude* from Wayne State with a Juris Doctorate and served as editor of the Wayne State Law Review.



Accompanying her fervor and accomplishments as a lawyer, Warrow continues to feed her appetite for theatre. In 2007, she and several artistic partners, founded <u>The Ringwald Theatre</u> in Ferndale. Again, Warrow in 2010, "[The Ringwald Theatre] wants to change the way people think through exploring different social norms and have people leaving the theatre going, 'Hey, I never thought about it that way'... We like to push the envelope a little bit."

As an actor, Warrow's Blanche DuBois in Tennessee Williams' A Streetcar Named Desire, received a 2016 Encore Michigan Wilde Award for best actress. She gave audiences a magnificent portrayal of Ivy in Tracy Letts' August: Osage County, and as Agnes Eggling in Tony Kushner's A Bright Room Called Day. Another notable performance was Liz in Samuel D. Hunter's The Whale, a co-production with The Ringwald Theatre and Detroit Mercy Theatre Company. Her rendition of Grace Hardy in Brian Friel's Faith Healer, with the Abreact Theatre Collective, gave her two best actress nods from the Encore Michigan Wilde Awards and the Rogue Critic Awards.

Some of her notable directing experiences include Andrew Bovell's *When the Rain Stops Falling*; David Mamet's *Glengarry Glen Ross*, and Conor McPherson's *Shining City*. Last season, Warrow directed DMTC's production and Michigan premiere of Ken Jones' *Alabama Story*. And most recently, her direction of *Evil Dead: The Musical*, at City Theatre, closed to great acclaim.

Lawyer Finds Balance

#### Kickham Hanley - Latest News on Jamie Warrow

What influenced you to work in the theatre? At first, when I was younger, I was like Paulinka in A Bright Room Called Day: I wanted all the great parts! But eventually, I matured, my ego receded, and I developed a passion for theatre as an active art form that gives immediate energy to a narrative and which requires the audience to engage. Basically, I like telling good stories using theatre artists as the medium.

What has been your proudest achievement as an artist? As a director, it's hard to narrow the shows that I'm proud of, but I believe my shining moments were: A) When the Rain Stops Falling by Andrew Bovell (January 2013) - this show, about redemption, forgiveness, and generational healing, with its exceptional cast and crew, was transcendent in its rare honesty and raw beauty; and B) Glengarry Glen Ross by David Mamet (February 2015) - simply the perfect cast telling this iconic story. As an actor I am most proud of my work as Blanche DuBois in Tennessee Williams' A Streetcar Named Desire and as Agnes Eggling in Tony Kushner's A Bright Room Called Day.

Who inspires your life? I am inspired by artists. I am inspired by individuals who live authentically. I am inspired by people who choose to be kind.

**What song do you have on repeat?** <u>"A Change is Gonna Come"</u> - Aretha Franklin's version. (And, yes, my *Alabama Story* peeps, still...)

**How do you prepare yourself before a show?** When in rehearsal I have a methodology for learning lines and I journal. I read my text aloud every day. By the week before tech I aim to be in a place to play. Before an actual performance, I like to visualize the show.

What is the musical you like to sing in the car? I know this is a theatre sin, but I do not have a favorite musical. Even worse, musicals generally are not my favorite.

What is your favorite line from A Bright Room Called Day? "Home. Now. An end to the exile. Before the sky and the ground slam shut. The borders are full of holes..."

# Keira Elyse Meet the Cast

Keira Elyse plays Zillah Katz in *A Bright Room Called Day*, which makes her first DMTC appearance on the Marlene Boll stage. The Livonia native and Wayne State alumna, just completed a successful run of *Evil Dead: The Musical* at City Theatre.

#### What influenced you to work in the theatre?

I've wanted to perform since I was a small child. I've always loved being someone else I guess. Honestly, I'll take any excuse to put on a costume. When I was a kid, I wanted to be about 50 different things and then I realized as an actor I could be all those things.

What has been your proudest achievement as an artist? Getting the opportunity for a second year with *Evil Dead: The Musical* at City Theatre. They usually swap out the ladies, so being asked to return felt really wonderful.

Who inspires your life? I have a lot of people who inspire me but certainly my family is a big inspiration.

I have a lot of really strong women to look up to and model myself after, most specifically my Mom, Nana, Granny, and Mamaw. As an actor my inspirations are mostly comedic actors like <a href="Megan Mullally">Megan Mullally</a>, <a href="Helena Bonham Carter">Helena Bonham Carter</a>, and <a href="Madeline Kahn">Madeline Kahn</a>. I love their ability to not care how they look on stage and how they can make a fool out of themselves and be completely content. It's something I aspire to do.

What song do you have on repeat? Anything by Heart.

**How do you prepare yourself before a show?** Pre-show, I'm all about the process of getting ready. The better mood I'm in, the better my performance will be. A lot of actors want to sit by themselves and think of their lines and blocking and character, but for me applying my makeup, doing my hair, and putting on my costume are the things that really take me from myself to my character.

What is the musical you like to sing in the car? I'm a big fan of <u>American Idiot</u>, the sung-through stage adaptation of <u>Green Day</u>'s rock opera <u>American Idiot</u>.

What is your favorite line from A Bright Room Called Day? "Before the sky and ground slams shut."
